

How can I nurture my child's skills in ELA?

- Maintain a well-stocked home library.
- Read with your children. Choose from many genres.
- Ask your children questions about what they are reading. Try to ask recall, analysis, evaluative, and synthesis questions.
- Don't use "baby-talk" with your children. Speak to them with high-level language and vocabulary. Encourage multilingual skills.
- Encourage diary, journal, or creative writing.
- Go on cultural outings to build background knowledge.



Questions for Reading: *The Three Little Pigs*

Recall

What happened in the story?

Evaluative

What effect does the rhyme pattern have on how the story is told?

Analysis

Why couldn't the wolf blow down the brick house?

Synthesis

How does the 1989 version, *The True Story of the Three Little Pigs*, by Jon Scieszca, both incorporate and satirize elements of the original story?

6th Grade to 7th Grade: Tips for Success

- Have an organized notebook or digital portfolio.
 - Attend Extra Help even if you are doing well. Consider it enrichment.
 - Let your guidance counselor know if you are struggling. Don't keep your struggles to yourself.
 - Make sure to continue reading books of your choice.
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-Communication is key! Don't be afraid to ask questions in class.

-Annotating books (or handouts) will help you study and remember important points in the text.

-9th grade report card grades go on your transcript, so keep your grades up! Low grades can compromise your GPA.
